August 21, 1967 - September 18, 2011

Dear Friend,

On Sunday, September 18, 2011, we lost a very special person. Someone who always had a smile on her face. Someone who made all of us laugh - every single day!

I was taught "always surround yourself with people smarter than you." Bea Reid was definitely MUCH smarter than me. Bea was not only the highest ranking civilian -- she was the first civilian and the first woman to reach the top of our organization. And, by the way, I know many of you have Bachelor's and Master's Degrees because Bea tutored you through Algebra.

You see, at the Sheriff's Office, Bea was the "Miracle Maker," and the master of detail.

Let me give you some examples:

While running the day-to-day operations of the Office of Business Affairs (supervising a total of 173 members), and providing services to our entire agency (of 1,931 members), Bea also had additional responsibilities thrust upon her:

- Coordinating the design & construction of the Sheriff's Operations Center - the single largest office space ever built for the Sheriff's Office. What a monumental task!
- Designing & constructing our law enforcement memorial.
- Overseeing the 1,000 bed addition to the South County Jail.
- Overseeing the construction of the Northeast District Command Center.
- Serving as the Treasurer of my re-election campaign.
- Doing the great things moms do to run a house for her family.



ALL OF THIS AT THE SAME TIME while fighting and beating a very serious form of breast cancer.

There is no doubt about it - Bea was a miracle maker.

Bea was brilliant, talented, energetic, enthusiastic, dedicated, loyal, tough - and most of all, a positive influence in everyone's lives she touched.

She was a common sense anchor -- especially during contentious staff meetings. I can remember her telling us, "Sometimes you guys take all of this way too serious - Relax, I will take care of it." AND SHE DID. Bea had a calming effect on a bunch of hard charging, high ranking cops. When Bea spoke, we all listened!

We all believe Bea was near-perfect, but sometimes, and it didn't happen often, she would burst into my office in full stride and say, "Okay, I'm here to confess -- I may have messed this up. So, hurry and yell at me. I'm busy and I've got work to do."

I would say, "Okay, Bea. On the outside chance you may have messed that up - go fix it." She would laugh that infectious laugh and leave at the same pace she arrived.

Bea was a real Democrat - and proud of it. During our animated discussions over office finances, she made me proud, and I complimented her for sounding and acting like a Republican. And, of course, that wasn't a compliment she loved.

But - and this was just her style- she would relish the occasions when she could say, "Now, don't you sound like a Democrat!" and I would accuse her of trying to convert me. She would reply, "Don't worry, we don't want you."

Toward the end of construction of our Sheriff's Operations Center, I made a mistake and asked for one last change. She looked at me and said, "Look, I'm tired of caring about things I really don't care about." We all busted into laughter. I said, "That is our quote of the year!"

We all loved Bea, and we will all miss her. In her memory we will always strive for the level of excellence and perfection she accomplished. After all, we owe it to Bea, because she was the miracle maker for all of us.

In Memoriam



Beatrice "Bea" Ann Reid was born in Star Lake, NY, and moved to Lakeland in 1977. Bea was a graduate of Kathleen High School, the University of Central Florida, and Troy University where she received her Master's Degree in Public Administration. She began working for the

Polk County Sheriff's Office in 1996, where she was the highest ranking civilian member at the agency. Bea was actively involved as a parishioner and volunteer at St. Clement Catholic Church in Plant City, Lakeland Kiwanis Club, Citizens CPR, Central Florida Speech and Hearing Center, and Polk County Sheriff's Charities. Bea was recognized in 2011 as the Professional Woman of Distinction from the National Association of Women Business Owners in Lakeland.

Bea was preceded in death by her father Edwin A. Reid of Saranac Lake, NY, and brother, Robert Reid of Lakeland, FL. She is survived by her sons, Matthew Kirkland and Dillon Kirkland of Plant City, FL; stepchildren, Taylor Dickey and Lawson Dickey of Lakeland; mother, Irene Kennelly of Lakeland; brothers, Steve Reid of Lake Placid, NY, and Kenneth Reid of Massena, NY; sisters, Elizabeth Pitcher of Stony Brook, NY and Margaret Little of Omaha, NE.

A mass of Christian burial for Bea was held on Thursday, September 22, 2011, at the Church of the Resurrection in Lakeland. She was interred at Oak Hill Burial Park on U.S. 98 South in Lakeland, with law enforcement honors.



Bea's Legacy

Bea left behind two sons, and many other beloved family members. It is understood by everyone that her sons, Matthew and Dillon Kirkland, were her pride and joy. They meant the world to her.

Matt, who turned 21 years old on September 23rd, wrote a beautiful eulogy and poem for his mother and read it at her funeral service on Thursday, September 22nd. Matthew is a sophomore at UCF in Orlando. Dillon, who turned 17 years old on September 6th, is a junior at Plant City High School.

The following is an excerpt of the eulogy Matt wrote:



My beautiful mother, Beatrice Ann Reid, was the best.

When I was preparing to speak about my mom, I tried to collect adjectives that would best describe all of her wonderful qualities, with an honor that she deserves. One particular word seemed to frequently outshine all of the others: best. She was the best. The best employee, the best boss, the best hugs, the best kisses, the best smiles, and the best laughs. The best woman, the best sister, the best daughter, the best Mother, and the best friend. My best friend.

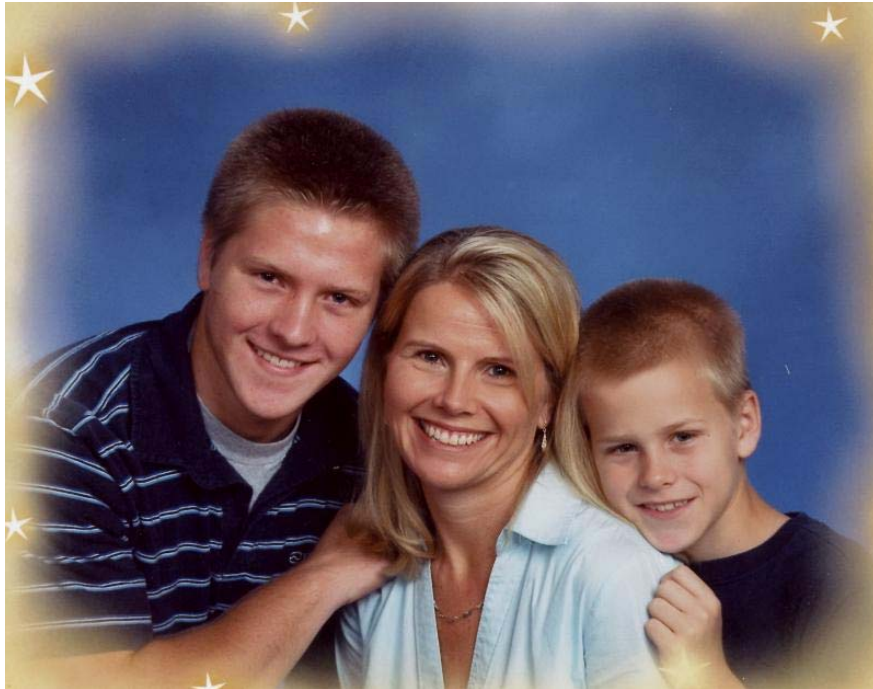
And judging by the number of people present today, I can see that the way my family and I feel about her is not just due to our family obligations, but because she really was that amazing. Over the years I've heard countless stories about how great she was at the Sheriff's Office, always determined to do all she could. She optimistically approached every task no matter what it entailed: volunteering for clubs and events, in leadership positions - she always, always was willing to lend a helping hand. She loved you.

I know not only from experience that all the loving things said are more than true, but from the fact that I know how capable she was, doing amazing acts that others would never dream of doing, and because she always took care of my siblings and I, as a mother. If she worked half as hard at the office to get things done as she did at home to make sure we were always as happy as possible, then the Sheriff's Office had to feel like they lucked out every day when she showed up for work. Because I know just how lucky I am to have had her as a mom.

Soccer practice, basketball practice, and football -- every night of her week was spent driving back from field to court to field, always with a smile on her face and always eager to ask how it went, happy to know that we were happy playing what we enjoyed playing. For her, that was enough of a reason to devote her nights and weekends to us. Such a selfless person, my mother.

I myself am guilty of taking her for granted on occasion, and I will forever try to make it up to her. But I know that she is in a better place now, and knows just how loved and appreciated she was in every aspect of her life. She knows that her family loves her, and she knows that her friends will always miss her. And Mom, please know how much I appreciate everything you've ever done. And I appreciate all the memories that you've given me to help me through today, and the rest of my days without you.

You're the best, and I will always love you, Mom. I will miss you every day - you mean the world to me and you always will be the world's best Mom.

A Woman Of Distinction

Bea was hired by the Polk County Sheriff's Office on March 4, 1996, as Finance Supervisor. She quickly became a valuable asset to PCSO. In September 1996, she was promoted to Finance Administrator and to Deputy Director of Finance in October 2002.

Sheriff Judd appointed Bea the Executive Director of Business Affairs in January 2005 - a new position created as part of his new administration. She was the highest ranking civilian member at the Polk County Sheriff's Office and the third highest ranking executive staff member (after Sheriff Judd and Chief of Staff Steve Lester). She led and managed all administrative aspects of the Sheriff's Office including finance, human resources, training, fleet operations, information technology, and business services.

Bea earned advanced academic degrees through the master's level. She was a Certified Public Accountant and a Florida Certified Public Manager. She was a parishioner and volunteer at St. Clement Catholic Church; she belonged to and was treasurer for the Lakeland Kiwanis Club; served on the Board of Directors of the Citizens CPR; served on the Board of Directors of Central Florida Speech and Hearing Center; and was the volunteer Executive Director of Polk Sheriff's Charities, a large, multi-purpose charity that supports public safety causes. Bea coordinated the first two "Bustin' Clays With Grady Judd" annual fundraising event for Polk Sheriff's Charities (October 2009 and March 2010 -- the next event is scheduled for March 2012). Bea was a breast cancer survivor and energetically supported the fight against the disease.



In May 2011, Sheriff Judd presented Bea with a PCSO Meritorious Service Medal for her outstanding leadership skills and exceptional performance during the planning, designing, building, and

relocation to the new Polk County Sheriff's Operations Center and Emergency Communications Center. This was the most recent of many awards and accolades Bea earned at PCSO.

In 2011, Bea was also recognized as the 2011 Professional Woman of Distinction from the National Association of Women Business Owners in Lakeland on Thursday, April 7, 2011. According to NAWBO, a Woman of Distinction is "a woman who exemplifies achievement, integrity, professionalism and community spirit. She is a woman who embodies those values and has distinguished herself in service to her organization, company and community."

At the time she was recognized by NAWBO, Sheriff Judd said: "Bea is proven professional who has earned the respect of her peers and everyone she supervises. She may not wear a uniform, but she certainly wears the agency's pride well - her bright and positive personality, can-do attitude, and exceptional teamwork and customer service philosophy, are examples for all of us to follow."

Chief of Staff Steve Lester had this to say: "Bea was the complete package. She was everything you would want in an employee, and especially as a leader. She was hard charging when she needed to be, but always showed genuine compassion and concern for her members. We will all miss her."

Bea's son Dillon (seen here with her nephew Connor) released a dove at the graveside service on Thursday, September 22, 2011. The dove is the universal symbol of peace, hope, and freedom. Bea may have lost some hair and even other things, but with prayers and love, the beautiful Bea became whole again, and beat that evil cancer.

The last planned magpie get-together was during the weekend of August 13-14, 2011. The magpies went out of town together. Bea brought gifts for everyone - matching watches. Bea said, "Open them all at once! See what they are? Know why? It's because I love 'spending time with you!'" All of the magpies laughed. They did not know that would be the last time they would all be together.

On September 18, 2011, the beautiful magpie named Bea flew far, far away. She is now free. All of her magpies will miss her dearly, but they are all grateful for every smile, every laugh, every memory, every story, every moment they shared with her. They will think of her with fondness, even through their tears, and they will tell her children as often as they get the chance how much she loved them and how truly special she was.

Thank you Bea, for sharing your life with us. Thank you for always letting the important people in your life know that you loved them. Thank you for packing more fun and excitement into your 44 years on earth than more people pack into twice that amount of time. Thank you for the memories, for the laughter, and even for the tears.
